## War on Drugs:

End the nearly 50-year war on drugs, it has failed, while costing billions of tax payer dollars. It's been ineffective at reducing drug use, addiction, & overdose, and fueled black markets that enrich criminal organizations, encourage more dangerous drug use, and leads to violence and instability. The only winners with prohibition are the cartels.

At the very least this should be removed from federal law and allow states and communities to define the solutions (nullification).
